Why this matters to you:

The illegal global trade of wildlife species as pets, for food, and as raw material threatens their survival and that of the ecosystems they inhabit. Trade of species needs to be legal, traceable, and sustainable. The CEC is building capacity in North America to help make the trade legal and sustainable to support the survival of sharks, tarantulas, timber, and turtle/tortoise species.

- Trilaterally agreed-upon actions have been identified for implementation through partnerships.
