



**Joint Public Advisory Committee (JPAC) Activity Report  
to the Council of the Commission for Environmental Cooperation (CEC)  
since June 2008**

This table is intended to provide Council with an overview of JPAC activities since the June 2008 Regular Session of Council to assist discussions during the annual joint Council/JPAC session in June 2009.

*Please note that JPAC activities have been undertaken IN ACCORDANCE with Article 16(4) of the North American Agreement on Environmental Cooperation (NAAEC), which states that JPAC “may provide advice to Council on any matter within the scope of this agreement [...] and on the implementation and further elaboration of this agreement, and may perform such other functions as the Council may direct”; and with Article 16(5), which provides that JPAC “may provide relevant technical, scientific or other information to the Secretariat, including for purposes of developing a factual record under Article 15. The Secretariat shall forward to the Council copies of any such information.”*

Please note the internal Council policy for producing responses to JPAC advice states that a response should be sent out **“within eight weeks of receiving the advice.”**

<p><b>Letter to Environment Canada</b>  From the JPAC Chair for 2008 to the Ministers  <i>(Distributed on 24 November 2008)</i></p>	<p>The JPAC Chair, Jane Gardner, sent a letter to the Council members on behalf of JPAC, concerning the expiration of the terms of the four Canadian members on 31 December 2008.</p> <p>Given the urgency of the situation, she respectfully requested that the selection process be expedited, and that a decision be made, ideally before their public meeting on 2 and 3 December in Puerto Vallarta, Mexico. She also sought clarification on whether the current members might perhaps continue temporarily in 2009 until a selection was made by Environment Canada.</p>	<p>Council replied, expressing their support of JPAC in its role as an advisory body. This panel explored what motivates industry-wide improvements in environmental performance, how industry is responding to these forces and how they are likely to change in the future.</p> <p><b>Panel II:</b> Drivers and barriers to environmental performance innovation. The experts at this roundtable discussed whether there is room for the participation of various sectors (private sector, public sector, academia, nongovernmental organizations, local and national governments) in defining and attaining improved environmental performance, as well as their roles.</p>	
<p><b>Advice to Council 08-02</b> Re: Public comment period for the proposed Operational Plan for the Commission for Environmental Cooperation (CEC) of North America for 2009 (Distributed on 4 December 2008)</p>	<p>JPAC urged the Council to approve the third draft of the CEC Operational Plan for immediate release and to post the document for public comment. They also informed the Council that they would seek input from the public for a period of 45 days.</p>	<p>Council acknowledged the importance of timely release and posting of the CEC Operational Plan, to allow ample opportunity for the public to develop and submit comments to the Secretariat.</p> <p>(Response received on 9 June 2009)</p>
<p><b>Advice to Council 08-03</b> Re: Proposed Operational Plan for the Commission for Environmental Cooperation (CEC) of North America for 2009 (Distributed on 4 December 2008)</p>	<p>After having received the proposed CEC Operational Plan for 2009, and discussed the first draft with the Secretariat staff in a private session held on 30 September 2008, in Montreal, Canada; followed by the second and third drafts, JPAC submitted a series of comments for Council's consideration which included:</p> <p>Impact of CEC Projects: JPAC recommended that the CEC provide a clear indication of the impact of work done in the past, focusing upon how 'on-the-ground' progress has been made in the relevant field, environmental issue, etc.</p> <p>Environmental Information: JPAC expressed their strong support for the mapping project, and suggested that the Secretariat expand its partnerships to include other organizations involved in mapping. This area would seem to be a natural fit for partnerships with</p>	<p>The Council replied and offered clarifications and comments on some of the points raised by the JPAC in their Advice.</p> <p>Among these:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Council's continued work with the CEC Secretariat and country experts, to ensure that projects in the Operational plan have a clear plan to deliver substantive results</li> <li>• How the Mapping North American Environmental Issues project fulfills a key mandate of the CEC, noting that access to reliable and pertinent information is critical for decision makers</li> <li>• The new direction for the SMOC initiative, from actions to reduce risks from individuals and specific chemicals, to a more comprehensive approach</li> </ul>

	<p>indigenous organizations, which often rely heavily on mapping to engage in the protection of their territories.</p> <p>Article 13 Report: JPAC suggested that the Secretariat look at life-cycle analyses of impacts of transportation, including land-, water- and air-based transportation of goods and people, in a North American context. In particular, focusing upon the ecosystemic, environmental, social and economic impacts and benefits from a carbon perspective would be very important analyses upon which to build cooperative efforts.</p> <p>Trade, Environment and Sustainability Work Program: JPAC recommended that the CEC take the opportunity to revisit assumptions about the most effective mechanism to evaluate the trade/environment nexus. They feel that the excellent academic analysis that has been conducted to-date can be built upon by shifting from a forensic analysis of the environmental impacts on trade, to an approach that is forward-looking—trying to analyze issues that are pressing or upcoming.</p> <p>While JPAC supports analysis in projects related to conservation, in particular regarding the identification of ecosystem-based values, they recommended caution regarding the element of the Biodiversity and Trade work plan related to harnessing market forces to achieve water protection and conservation.</p> <p>JPAC expressed support for the Green Building project and under pollutants and health, expressed concern about the shift away from the ‘NARAP’ approach to addressing chemicals in North America, to a risk management approach. 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	<p>JPAC is pleased with the communication actions outlined in the 2009 Operational Plan, aimed at raising awareness and reaching out to specialized audiences with project-related information. They are of the view that CEC work products and results should be more broadly disseminated, and JPAC will consider how it may, through its networks, play a role in achieving this.</p> <p>JPAC expressed their interest in participating more fully in the implementation of the Operational Plan, where relevant and helpful. They are willing to review the Plan in greater detail to determine areas, projects, initiatives where they may be able to contribute more fully or actively support, should the Council so wish.</p>
