Connecting communities across North America

Weighing less than a gram (*the weight of a paper clip*), monarch butterflies are capable of flying over 4500 kilometers to reach their most southerly wintering destination in Mexico. It takes only one generation—living up to nine months—to migrate from Canada or the United States to Mexico, but four generations to migrate north, laying eggs and reproducing the succeeding generations on their way back! Monarch larvae feed solely on milkweed along their <u>migratory routes.</u>

No milkweed, no monarchs!
