
- 1. The workshop has shown an extremely rich and interesting variety of initiatives and practices to reduce food waste. We now have to put it together.
- 2. A few "lessons" taken from the past 2½ days:






a. Re-emphasize the integrated Value Chain approach.

The Way Forward

- 1. The workshop has strongly focused on Food Waste Keep that focus.
- 2. The food waste issue and initiatives to reduce it have been on the national agenda's since at least 5 years.
- 3. FLW has become an official programme in COP has significant climate change mitigation potential.
- 4. Strong need to measure food waste at national level, and identify location and causes.



The Way Forward

- 5. Entry of the World Bank on the scene should support and complement on-going efforts.
- 6. The World Bank has a strong programme on country-support in urban, environmental, social, climate change, agriculture and nutrition that can cover the FLW agenda. Include the new element of FLW in these existing programmes.



The Way Forward

- 7. Public sector to develop national strategy for food waste reduction integrate into existing strategies.
- 8. Establish National Committees on Food Waste.
- 9. Involve private sector (actors in the value chains) and civil society (reaching out to consumers).
- 10. Develop projects: national and trans-national. Identify sources of funding: GEF, GCF, WB?
