




## Submissions on Enforcement Matters Process

- A submission is a written document filed by the public with the Secretariat asserting that Canada, Mexico or the United States is failing to effectively enforce its environmental laws
- Originally established in 1994 under the NAFTA regime
- SEM Process continues under USMCA/CUSMA Chapter 24


#### Submission on Enforcement Matters Process



### What Happens When the Secretariat Recommends a Factual Record?




# Submissions & Factual Records



### Loggerhead Turtle

- Centro Mexicano de Derecho Ambiental (CEMDA) and the Center for Biological Diversity filed a submission asserting that Mexico is failing to effectively enforce legal provisions meant to protect the loggerhead turtle (Caretta caretta) from fishing activities and other threats.
- The loggerhead turtle is listed as endangered under Mexican Law, but thousands of specimens have been found stranded or dead since 2010.
- These North Pacific Ocean loggerhead turtles migrate nearly 8,000 miles from nesting beaches in Japan to Baja California, Mexico where they grow to maturity (~20 years) before migrating back to the beaches where they hatched to mate, nest, and live out the rest of their lives.
- In April 2024, the Secretariat published a factual record on the loggerhead turtle, the first under the USMCA.



### Vaquita Porpoise

- Four US environmental advocacy groups filed a submission asserting that Mexico is failing to effectively enforce its environmental laws to protect the vaquita porpoise from decline caused by its bycatch in gillnets used to catch shrimp & other fish, including the totoaba which is also threatened by illegal fishing.
- The vaquita porpoise (*Phocoena sinus*) is the world's smallest cetacean and the most endangered marine mammal. Less than 10 vaquitas remain.
- On August 2025 the Secretariat published a Factual Record regarding the effective enforcement of the General Wildlife Law (Ley General de Vida Silvestre) and federal regulations governing fishing in vaquita habitat, including regulations that prohibit the use of gillnets and the capture of totoaba.



North Atlantic right whale

- Filed by Oceana, an NGO based in the US.
- Asserts that the United States is failing to effectively enforce environmental laws to protect the right whale from vessel strikes and entanglement in fishing gear.
- The North Atlantic right whale is one of the world's most endangered large whale species.
  - The latest estimate suggests there are approximately 384 left, with ~70 breeding females.
  - The prinicipal causes of mortality and serious injury are fishing gear entanglement and vessel strikes.
- Secretariat is set to publish the Final Factual Record on December 12 2025.
